Prostate Cancer Prognosis

- The overall prognosis for prostate cancer is among the best of all cancers.
- * Approximately 80 percent to 85 percent of all prostate cancers are detected in the local or regional stages, which represent stages I, II and III. Many men diagnosed and treated at the local or regional stages will be disease-free after five years.

<u>Dissemination of Misinformative and Biased Information about Prostate Cancer on YouTube.</u>

- * YouTube is a social media platform with more than 1 billion users and >600000 videos about prostate cancer. Two small studies examined the quality of prostate cancer videos on YouTube, but did not use validated instruments, examine user interactions, or characterize the spread of misinformation.

<u>High-Intensity Focused Ultrasound Technique Effectively Treats Intermediate-Risk Prostate Cancer with</u> Minimal Side Effects

- * A technique that delivers high-intensity focused ultrasound to targeted tissue under MRI guidance effectively treats intermediate-risk prostate cancer with minimal side effects, according to a study published in *Radiology*.
- * A class of treatments called focal therapy offers an alternative for some men with intermediate-risk disease that is still confined to the prostate.

2020 Hindsight and 2021 Foresight

- * By all accounts outside of our world of prostate cancer, 2020 was a pretty bad year. That much has been decided and agreed upon by just about everyone in the world. With that said, 2020 was not a horrible year in the progress against prostate cancer. Several new developments arose and progressed in the past year that can give us hope and new options for patients. Along those lines, it can give us an optimistic look at 2021 as well, as the developments of 2020 are but a precursor to some of the moments that may await us in 2021.

Mediterranean Diet May Affect the Progression of Prostate Cancer for Men on Active Surveillance

- * In a study to examine a Mediterranean diet in relation to prostate cancer progression in men on active surveillance, researchers from The University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center found that men with localized prostate cancer who reported a baseline dietary pattern that more closely follows the key principles of a Mediterraneanstyle diet fared better over the course of their disease.

Most Diverse Analysis Ever Conducted for Prostate Cancer Shows Genetic Role in Health Disparities

- * Some racial and ethnic groups suffer relatively more often, and fare worse, from common ailments compared to others. Prostate cancer is one disease where such health disparities occur: Risk for the disease is about 75% higher, and prostate cancer is more than twice as deadly, in blacks compared with whites. Yet whites are often overrepresented as research participants, making these differences difficult to understand and, ultimately, address.

<u>Salvage Surgery in Patients with Local Recur-</u> <u>rence After Radical Prostatectomy - Beyond</u> the Abstract

- * In prostate cancer (PCa), recurrences are frequently observed even after curatively intended primary treatment such as radical prostatectomy (RP). Since the introduction of prostate-specific membrane antigen (PSMA)-positron emission tomography (PET) imaging, these recurrences may be accurately delineated, even at very low prostate-specific antigen (PSA) levels

Overall Survival and Other Secondary Endpoint Data Gain FDA Approval for NUBEQA® (darolutamide) Label

- * Bayer announced that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved a supplemental New Drug Application (sNDA) to add overall survival (OS) and other secondary endpoint data from the Phase III ARAMIS trial to the NUBE-QA® (darolutamide) Prescribing Information. NUBEQA significantly reduced the risk of death by 31%, offering men with non-metastatic castration-resistant prostate cancer (nmCRPC) extended survival for a greater chance of living longer.
