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

Guest Speaker: Don Wood, Patient & Family

Advisor with Cancer Care Alberta

Don Wood was a caregiver for his late wife Sherry, who battled Stage 4 metastatic cancer for 3 years, before losing her battle in early 2020. Don also lost his only brother Ken as a young adult who battled Leukemia briefly. Don has lived his life with Cancer - face to face. Don started volunteering shortly after Sherry's treatments began as a way to give back, sharing his experiences as a caregiver.



He is currently, the Co-chair for the Cancer Strategic Clinical Network (C-SCN) Alberta Cancer Diagnosis Initiative (ACDI) and a member of the Core SCN Committee for Alberta Health Services. He is also on the Patient and Family Advisory Council (PFAC) for the Calgary Cancer Centre/Tom Baker Cancer Centre and the (PFAC) group for the University of Calgary (Cuthbert Lab and Oncology Outcomes).

Don is a very active member on a National and Provincial basis with 3CTN (Canadian Cancer

Clinical Trials Network) and locally with the University of Calgary, Kaye Edmonton Clinic (KEC), and Alberta SPOR SUPPORT Unit. Don is also on the Technical Board of Advisors for the Calgary based health care company Qualisure Diagnostics Inc.

Don has 3 children and 2 Grandchildren and is an entrepreneur and philanthropist for Cancer initiatives.

Could More Testosterone Be the Hidden Key to Fighting Prostate Cancer?

- Androgen deprivation therapy (ADT) has been the bedrock of treatment for advanced prostate cancer for more than half a century. But investigators at Johns Hopkins are rethinking it in a way that sounds counterintuitive and driving new approaches to tackle treatment resistance. They're discovering that shaking up prostate cancer with high-dose testosterone makes it more vulnerable to other treatments.

Mobile Audio Recording Technology to Promote Informed Decision Making in Advanced Prostate Cancer

- Men with metastatic castration-resistant prostate cancer increasingly encounter complex treatment decisions. Consultation audio recordings and summaries promote patient informed decision making but are underutilized. Mobile recording software applications may increase access. Little is known regarding the feasibility of implementation in clinical encounters.

- Two key pieces of eating well are 1) the best foods and 2) the optimal amount of food. #1 has some variation among individuals, but research has consistently shown that a variety of brightly-colored vegetables supplies the body with the cancer-fighting, immune-boosting nutrients everyone needs. Exploring predictors of and barriers to online prostate cancer community use: A cross-sectional survey of users and non-users.

- * Prostate cancer survivors are increasingly turning to online communities for support. This study explored predictors of and barriers to use. A prospective survey of 141 Australian prostate cancer survivors assessed sociodemographic, clinical, psychosocial, and attitudinal characteristics associated with intention to use, and subsequent use of online communities.

New Endoscopic In-Office Surgical Therapies for Benign Prostatic Hyperplasia: A Systematic Review - Beyond the Abstract

- * A variety of minimally invasive surgical therapies for the treatment of benign prostatic hyperplasia (BPH) have been introduced in recent years with a significant shift towards outpatient procedures. Early studies suggest that these therapies provide adequate symptomatic relief while minimizing some of the disadvantages associated with standard surgical approaches. However, understanding their unique roles in the treatment landscape for BPH requires an appreciation of the varied protocols and outcomes that comprise these studies.

Outcomes of a Noninferiority Randomised Controlled Trial of Surgery for Men with Urodynamic Stress Incontinence After Prostate Surgery

- Persistent stress urinary incontinence (SUI) following surgery for prostate cancer is the strongest negative predictor of health-related quality-of-life after radical prostatectomy. Post-prostatectomy incontinence (PPI) is highly prevalent based on validated patientreported outcome measures and 5% of all patients ultimately require surgical treatment.

Role of Survivorship Program in Urologic— Oncologic Care

- * A survivorship program aims to address the unmet needs of patients with cancer during and beyond their treatment. The investigators conducted a quality-improvement study in their center to evaluate the functioning of the institutional prostate cancer survivorship program. In this patient-survey evaluation, both patients (n = 88) and their respective partners (n = 70) were included. Most patients (91%) and their partners (84%) advocated for having pre- and postoperative survivorship support following surgery.

Standing Variations Modeling Captures Inter-Individual Heterogeneity in a Deterministic Model of Prostate Cancer Response to Combination Therapy

- * We take as a case-study, the treatment of metastatic, castration-resistant prostate cancer with the live cell vaccine, sipuleucel-t (Provenge). Only a fraction of patients benefited from Provenge; that is, clinical success is a rare event. It remains an open question why <u>Provenge</u> conferred such a modest survival benefit.

- * The American Cancer Society's annual Cancer Facts & Figures released this week shows some encouraging trends: death rates for cancer overall continue to decline for both men and women. For prostate cancer that is confined to the prostate or the region around it at diagnosis, five-year survival rates remain close to 100%.
