consultant work for all industries.

Hal Eagletail, who is an elder advisor at Poundmaker Lodge treatment center, is familiar with the benefits that his culture's traditional healing practices can bring to both Indigenous and non-Indigenous people. He helps hospital patients get back to health with traditional knowledge of herbs and ceremony.

In 2020, his daughter Stephanie Crowchild began Eagletail House Society as a non-profit in her late grand-parents' house. People can come to Eagletail House to take part in traditional healing practices, but also to access resources on how to navigate the court system and CFS.

He and his family hope that they will soon see healing homes like Eagletail house on First Nations across the country. He said that homes like the one his daughter created are an exciting opportunity for those eager to participate in reconciliation efforts.

Humor is one of First Nations best healing medicines and Hal Eagletail has no shortage of that to prescribe.

What is True North Peer Navigation?

True North Peer Navigation is a virtual navigation program that connects individuals diagnosed with prostate cancer with support from a peer navigator who has experienced prostate cancer himself, as well as a library of resources.

Who can participate?

- Men who have completed treatment for prostate cancer within the last 3 months
- Comfortable using computers and the internet

What does it involve to participate?

- Able to communicate with your Peer Navigator through secure online chat, telephone or video, either upfront or after a wait time of 6 months
- 2. Connected with your Peer Navigator for a period of 3 months
- Provided access to an online library of useful resources about prostate cancer
- 4. Asked to complete questionnaires to help evaluate the program
